inter-workings of the computers they're selling, he said.

"We are not the cheapest store; we want to be the best," added Schwanitz. "We want people to come back for their second and third computers for quality systems that they don't have to pay more to replace."

That's exactly the type of business ACT has achieved since opening their doors five years ago -- a loyal clientele who appreciate quality service and computers.

Schwanitz also understands that computers aren't a one-size-fits-all type of product. He takes the time to talk with computer buyers to make sure they get the right system that meets their particular needs.
